The FY2024 Consolidated Annual Performance Evaluation Report (CAPER) marks the first year for the City of Minot as an Entitlement Community with the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD). FY2024 is also the first year of implementation under the City of Minot's 2024-2029 Consolidated Plan. The Consolidated Plan serves as a five-year strategic framework that identifies the City's most critical housing and community development needs, prioritizes investment strategies, and establishes measurable goals to track progress in improving outcomes for Minot's low-income residents.

The City's projected outcomes over the 2024-2029 Consolidated Plan include the following:

- Provide decent housing by preserving the affordable housing stock, increasing the availability of affordable housing, reducing discriminatory barriers, increasing the supply of supportive housing for those with special needs, and transitioning homeless persons or families into housing.
- Provide a suitable living environment through safer, more livable neighborhoods, greater integration of LMI residents throughout Minot, increased housing opportunities, and reinvestment in LMI neighborhoods.
- Expand economic opportunities through targeted public services, homeownership opportunities, development activities that promote long-term community viability, and the empowerment of low- and moderate-income individuals to achieve self-sufficiency.

As the City of Minot is a new grantee receiving an annual allocation from the HUD Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) program, the FY2024 program year included many planning and administrative efforts for the public services, public facilities and infrastructure improvements and housing activities. City staff worked diligently on various policies and procedures, citizen participation plans, and action plan development during the program year. Subrecipient agreements are being drafted to fully obligate the Public Services activity in the upcoming months. City staff are also working with a local nonprofit organization that is proposing to utilize the funds in the Public Facilities and Infrastructure Improvements activity.

Reaching out to homeless persons (especially unsheltered persons) and assessing their individual needs

The City of Minot continues to work with local partners to reach the local homeless population and assess their needs. The City remains committed to helping residents maintain stable housing and assisting individuals who are already experiencing homelessness in transitioning into housing. With no current year-round shelter open in Minot, addressing this need is a high priority.

Addressing the emergency shelter and transitional housing needs of homeless persons

The City of Minot recently approved a non-profit to take over the operation and maintenance of a Family Homeless Shelter as well as a seventeen (17) unit LMI apartment complex and contract negotiations are underway.

Helping low-income individuals and families avoid becoming homeless, especially extremely low-income individuals and families and those who are: likely to become homeless after being discharged from publicly funded institutions and systems of care (such as health care facilities, mental health facilities, foster care and other youth facilities, and corrections programs and institutions); and, receiving assistance from public or private agencies that address housing, health, social services, employment, education, or youth needs

The City of Minot does not directly participate in the discharge planning or protocols for individuals leaving publicly funded institutions or healthcare systems.

Helping homeless persons (especially chronically homeless individuals and families, families with children, veterans and their families, and unaccompanied youth) make the transition to permanent housing and independent living, including shortening the period of time that individuals and families experience homelessness, facilitating access for homeless individuals and families to affordable housing units, and preventing individuals and families who were recently homeless from becoming homeless again

The City continues efforts to support the transition of individuals experiencing homelessness and remain flexible so service providers can adapt to their clients' needs as economic and housing conditions change.

The City of Minot meets regularly with the Minot Housing Authority (MHA) to discuss opportunities for partnership and expansion of available housing to meet the needs of the citizens.

Over the recent years, the City of Minot's economic development staff have worked to bring new job opportunities and opportunities to continue educational advancement in or out of the workplace. This is crucial as the area struggles with boom-bust cycles for oil and other industries.
